Barbara Ibbitson, BSW, RSW, MSW, is a registered social worker. She has a private practice and has been working in the rehabilitation field for 20 years. She specializes in trauma and recovery, and more specifically works with brain injured individuals and their families.

Karen Mock, PhD, a human rights consultant, is the former Executive Director of the Canadian Race Relations Foundation and of the League for Human Rights of B'nai Brith Canada. She is qualified by the courts as an expert in racism, discrimination, antisemitism and hate group activity, and chaired the Hate Crimes Community Working Group for the Government of Ontario. An educational psychologist by training, she is considered a pioneer in the field of multicultural/antiracist education, and has taught at the university level for more than 30 years.

Janet Morrison, M.A., C. Psych Assoc., is registered with the College of Psychologists of Ontario and is the Past President of the Canadian Association of Psychoanalytic Child Therapists. Currently, she is a teaching and supervising member of the Toronto Child Psychoanalytic Program and an Adjunct Lecturer at the FIFSW. Her private practice includes psychological assessments and psychotherapy for children, adolescents and adults, and parent coaching.

Marina Nemat After the Islamic Revolution of 1979, Marina was arrested and spent more than two years in Evin, a political prison in Tehran. It has been short listed for many literary awards, including the Young Minds Award in the UK and the Borders Original Voices Award in the US. In 2008/2009, she was an Aurea Fellow at University of Toronto's Massey College, where she wrote her second book, "After Tehran: A Life Reclaimed".


