### Please provide a description of the practicum site and student activities:

The Linkage to Care Program provides intensive case management for people living with HIV, prioritizing community members who identify as Indigenous, Black and Persons of Colour (IBPOC). The program recognizes that people face many challenges in trying to navigate the complex systems of immigration, criminal justice, poverty, addictions and mental health, gendered violence, generational trauma, and forced displacement on their own.

The Linkage to Care Program Team is committed to providing support, connections, and care through referrals to necessary services, accompaniments, and advocacy. The Team has several case managers which include people with lived experience. The program offers a mix of outreach, team-based case management, and individual case management to support community members in navigating these systems."

## Accessibility Considerations in practicum:

- Will the student have access to a private space for notes or computer use? Yes
- Are there breaks between clients/patients/meetings? Sometimes
- Is the practicum considered fast-paced? Fast
- Is there a high noise level in the practicum? Medium
- Is the site wheelchair accessible? No
- What are the physical demands of the practicum? Student will be expected to be on their feet for most
  of the day, oftentimes off-site and in the community regardless of weather. So must prepare
  accordingly. Student is expected to use transit/TTC to travel between appointments and client visits.
  Student will also be expected to enter client units. Placement may involve support with unit
  maintenance and eviction prevention work, which can include lifting of heavy items, removing clutter,
  organizing units, and housekeeping. They will be working independently with minimal supervision,
  though supervisor is available by phone. Beginning placement will include more shadowing and then
  transition to independent learning.
- Are there any other accessibility considerations that potential applicants with disabilities should be aware of? Placement students may be triggered when working with clients. Program supports clients who are experiencing crisis, psychosis symptoms, suicidal ideations, and other significant mental health concerns, in addition to homelessness and substance use.
