Please provide a description of the practicum site and student activities:

Veterinary social work is a specialized field that focuses on supporting the human components of veterinary medicine and animal welfare. Professionals in this field provide support and assistance to individuals and families facing the emotional, psychological, and social challenges associated with pet parenting, animal welfare, and the veterinary care process.

The veterinary social work student placement the University of Guelph Ontario Veterinary College and Health Sciences Centre (OVC HSC) offers a unique opportunity for students pursuing a career in social work to gain invaluable experience in the specialized field of veterinary social work. This placement provides a dynamic learning environment where students can apply their social work skills to support both pet parents and veterinary professionals, contributing to the well-being of animals and their human companions. Responsibilities:

- Client Support: Work closely with pet parents and their families, providing emotional support, counseling, and guidance to help them cope with the challenges of pet illness, end-of-life decisions, and grief. Assist in creating care plans that consider the emotional and social aspects of veterinary care.
- Education and Outreach: Develop and deliver educational programs and resources
 related to pet loss and bereavement, the human-animal bond, veterinary mental health,
 and other relevant topics. Engage in community outreach initiatives to promote
 awareness of veterinary social work and its importance.
- 3. **Interdisciplinary Collaboration:** Collaborate with the veterinary care team, including veterinarians, veterinary technicians, and other healthcare professionals, to ensure a

- holistic approach to animal care that considers the emotional and psychological needs of pet parents.
- 4. **Documentation:** Maintain detailed and confidential records of client interactions and interventions, adhering to all ethical and legal standards of social work practice.
- 5. **Research and Program Development:** Assist in ongoing projects related to veterinary social work and contribute to the development of new programs or services that enhance the hospital's capacity to address the emotional needs of clients and wellness of staff.
