Get ready for an incredible opportunity to have a meaningful impact on the lives of others! As a student in this practicum, you'll have the chance to directly connect with clients through: 1) virtual counseling services, and 2) innovative, community-based interventions that can be delivered virtually or in person.

But that's not all - you'll also get to collaborate with a range of community organizations, including Christie Ossington Neighbourhood Centre, Jane Finch Centre, LOFT, Parkdale Community Legal Services, TAIBU Community Health Centre, and Unison Community Health & Community Services, just to name a few. We are also creating new initiatives with UofT's Kinesiology and Physical Education and the Kimel Family Centre for Brain Health & Wellness.

Imagine the impact you'll have as you provide individual counseling services through video therapy or phone, supporting individuals who face multiple challenges to find their path to wellness. And if you're craving inperson interactions, this practicum also provides in-person elements such as conducting one-off workshops and ongoing group sessions with seniors and other community residents.

What truly sets this opportunity apart is our focus on serving communities that face health and equity challenges, as well as Black and other racialized communities in the Greater Toronto Area. The Clinic also offers ongoing in-service training opportunities that take students through the therapeutic process and attend to any emerging issues risen from client work. By joining our team, you'll be at the forefront of promoting equality and making a lasting impact on these communities.

While prior experience in mental health, distress centers, or working with our target populations is a plus, we're also looking for self-directed individuals who can thrive both in a team and independently. So, if you're ready to take on this exciting and rewarding challenge, don't miss out on this incredible opportunity to make a difference in the lives of others!

This practicum primarily focuses on direct practice. Students will:

- 1. Carry a caseload of clients; leading intake, assessment and counselling sessions
- 2. Facilitate in person and virtual workshops and group programming to community residents and agency staff
- 3. Attend weekly team meetings for discussion of their cases and processing in the large group

- 4. Participate in learning opportunities such as orientation, weekly supervisions (individual and group supervision in alternate weeks), case conferences, and in-service training
- 5. Complete assigned readings to complement their work and their learning in classes

In addition, **students will be involved in various indirect practice initiatives**, including but not limited to, working with community partners to create new initiatives, participating in community advocacy, and assisting with the Clinic's administrative tasks.

Remote with hybrid component. The Clinic operates virtually, however Wednesdays are an optional in-person day and some of the community groups/programs may be in person.

This site offers practicum 3 days a week throughout the entire practicum. Students who complete Spring/Summer practicum will finish in late August or early September at a pre-negotiated time with the supervisor and the Clinic Director. The Clinic's operational hours are: Wednesday & Thursday 12:00pm – 8:00pm; Friday 9:00am – 5:00pm.

The first two to three weeks of practicum will be student orientation. Attendance is required 9:00am to 5:00pm Wednesday to Friday.
