### **Practicum Description**

Consent Comes First: The Office of Sexual Violence Support and Education works with Toronto Metropolitan University students affected by sexual violence. We also provide education, training and advocacy with the wider campus community. Our services are available to all TMU students regardless of when and where the violence occurred.

We believe that people affected by sexual and gender-based violence should guide the process, and we are here to provide options in a trauma-informed way. We recognize that people are impacted differently based on varied and interlocking oppressions. How people experience, heal from, and address sexual violence is shaped by the multitude of social locations, e.g. class, sexuality, citizenship status and gender expression.

Consent Comes First, the Office of Sexual Violence Support and Education is part of Toronto Metropolitan University. At the intersection of mind and action, TMU is on a transformative path to becoming Canada's leading comprehensive innovation university. Integral to this path is the placement of equity, diversity and inclusion as fundamental to our institutional culture.

#### <u>Description of Role and Responsibilities</u>

The successful candidate will work alongside an interdisciplinary team to provide compassionate, trauma and violence-informed, intersectional support to TMU students affected by sexual violence and gender-based violence.

- Manage a small caseload of clients (intake, case management, counselling) with people affected by sexual violence and gender-based violence i.e. survivors, their families, loved ones, friends, parents;
- Conduct case management related to safety and justice and assessing personal, legal and social needs;
- Maintain up to date client records and reports;
- Opportunities to create and run support groups and workshops related to trauma, sexual and gender-based violence for specific populations;
- Opportunities to create accessible resources, materials related to trauma, sexual and gender-based violence;
- Gain project coordination skills in the implementation and coordination of sexual violence education activities;
- Learn and incorporate into work knowledge of current laws, legislation, research and best practices in the area of sexual violence, gender-based violence, education, sexual health and bystander intervention;
- Opportunities to participate in research projects on sexual violence and gender-based violence;
- Participate in daily team case conference meetings and planning;
- Participate in professional development opportunities;

• Build effective relationships and work collaboratively with students, faculty, staff, administrators, and community partners.

**Hours:** 9 - 5, with an occasional prearranged early evening event or workshop.

This practicum is suited for students in Social Justice and Diversity and Mental Health and Health fields of study.

- Police Reference/Vulnerable Sector Check
- Comfort working with the population being served
- Availability for occasional evening programming
- Previous experience in gender-based violence, sexual violence or trauma informed work an asset
- Experience practically applying intersectional, anti-oppressive framework
- Grounded understanding of confronting racism including Anti-Black Racism and Anti-Indigenous Racism
- Comfortable working in a fast-paced environment
- Comfortable working in a team and independently
