Practicum Description

Youth Association for Academics, Athletics, and Character Education (YAAACE) is a Black-led, Black-focused, and Black-serving organization, operating in the Jane and Finch community since 2007, providing culturally reflective programs and services to mitigate the opportunity gap for racialized and under-resourced communities. YAAACE serves 1000+ families and clients annually in a range of programs related to academics, athletics, expanded opportunities, employment, and violence prevention and intervention. YAAACE has extensive experience working with multiple partners, stakeholders, and all three levels of government to deliver programs and services, as well as engage in data-driven knowledge mobilization and publications. YAAACE staff include 21 full-time members as well as other part-time practitioners and coaches.

Vision: Thriving communities free from systemic barriers and inequities.

Mission: YAAACE uses strength-based approaches to advocate for and create safer communities through programs and services that are accessible and culturally reflective.

Core Values: Awareness, Advocacy, Accountability, Action, and Access

Key Issues YAAACE is Addressing:

- Challenging stereotypes and biased narratives about Black families and communities.
- Addressing the risk factors that contribute to the school to prison pipeline
- Advocating for innovative solutions to address the roots of violence.
- Creating and promoting best practices to ensure institutional accountability and transparency in the social service sector.

YAAACE is committed to dismantling systemic barriers and nurturing equitable opportunities for all. Positioned at the forefront of Black-led organizations, YAAACE embodies its vision of flourishing communities liberated from the grip of inequity through culturally reflective practices and inclusive initiatives. Engaging in practicum activities at YAAACE offers students a multifaceted experience, encompassing diverse roles and responsibilities aimed at fostering professional growth and community impact. Students have the opportunity to shadow social workers, gaining firsthand insights into client interactions and the intricacies of providing support to individuals in need. Moreover, they shadow key personnel such as the Founding and Executive Director and case workers, actively participating in programs like "TO Wards Peace" and "New Narrative" aimed at violence prevention and intervention, particularly supporting justice-involved youth and adults. In addition to direct involvement with clients, students engage in research and literature reviews, delving into topics surrounding firearm-related homicides, injuries, and serious violence, with a focus on understanding their disproportionate impact on Black and under-resourced communities. This research not only enriches their understanding of systemic challenges but also informs YAAACE's advocacy efforts and program development initiatives as part of its <u>Centre for Community Safety and Roots of Violence</u>. Further, students partake in community outreach activities and community-asset mapping, particularly in the Jane and Finch community. Through these endeavors, they actively engage with community members, identify existing resources, and assess community needs, contributing to the development of tailored programs and services that address the unique challenges faced by residents.

Under the mentorship of seasoned professionals deeply rooted in YAAACE's core values, students emerge from the practicum experience equipped with a holistic understanding of social work practices, a commitment to advocacy, and a profound appreciation for the transformative power of community-driven initiatives. Their contributions not only advance YAAACE's mission but also empower them to become catalysts for change within their own communities, embodying the spirit of equity, diversity, and social justice.
