



Longitudinal IPE Facilitator Training (LIFT) Program

LIFT Program Orientation:

Tuesday October 1st, 2024 | 6:00pm – 6:30pm | Virtual on Zoom

Students wishing to develop facilitation and collaborative leadership skills are encouraged to register for **LIFT**.

This program is open to 100 students (10 students from each program) who will be paired with a peer; you will co-facilitate together at various activities as part of this program.



The objectives of the **LIFT** Program are to:

- Develop & practice collaborative leadership skills, including facilitation of effective team processes for shared decision-making & establish a climate for shared leadership, accountability, & collaborative practice.
- Apply education science principles during facilitation of IPE foundational learning activities

Interprofessional Health Arts and Humanities Certificate

- Narrative-Based Healthcare (4 sessions)
- The Performance of Healthcare: How Creative Play Can Enhance Collaboration, Develop Embodied Presence, and Encourage Supportive Practice (4 sessions)

Facilitators

A **facilitator** is a process guide who focuses discussions and clarifies understanding, while encouraging shared decision-making and problem-solving.

A facilitator assists the group in creating and achieving common goals and expectations.

The facilitator works to empower individuals or groups to learn for themselves or find their own answers to problems.






IPE Management System

Student Record






IPE Withdrawal & DNA


- Registration for all learning activities open 3 weeks prior to the activity date, and close 48 hours prior
 - Each program has a different time at which registration opens
- We ask that students retain a level of professionalism in respect for the number of spots that each activity can accommodate and withdraw 48 hours in advance of a learning activity
- You can withdraw from the activity via your 'Student Record' on the IPE Management System
- A **DNA** (Did Not Attend) will appear on your student record should you miss an activity you have registered for


